



Dear Friends in Christ.

The great Father of the Church, St. Jerome, who was renowned for his knowledge of Sacred Scripture, and who translated the whole



Bible into Latin (Known as The Latin Vulgate) is rumored to have proclaimed that "Ignorance of Sacred Scripture is ignorance of Christ." On occasion, I have heard it said the Catholic Church dissuades the laity from reading the Bible. This sentiment likely dates back to the sixteenth century and the protestant reformation. We should be mindful that the printing press was invented near the end of the fifteenth century. This allowed literacy to increase across Europe and soon Bibles were printed for a far cheaper cost. The reformers took advantage of this situation by promoting interpretation of Sacred Scripture in ways that led many people astray from authentic interpretation of the Bible. In the wake of all this confusion, it is likely that some priests and perhaps even bishops urged the laity to not read the Bible.

Even so, there has never been an authoritative prohibition of the reading and praying with Scripture. In fact, the opposite is the case. The Second Vatican document on divine revelation, Dei Verbum (The Word of God) promotes widespread access to the Bible: Easy access to Sacred Scripture should be provided for all the Christian faithful. It devolves on sacred bishops "who have the apostolic teaching" to give the faithful entrusted to them suitable instruction in the right use of the divine books, especially the New Testament and above all the Gospels. This can be done through translations of the sacred texts, which are to be provided with the necessary and really adequate explanations so that the children of the Church may safely and profitably become conversant with the Sacred Scriptures and be penetrated with their spirit. Furthermore, editions of the Sacred Scriptures, provided with suitable footnotes, should be prepared also for the use of non-Christians and adapted to their situation. Both pastors of souls and Christians generally should see to the wise distribution of these in one way or another. (Dei Verbum, #22,25)

In Second Reading this weekend, St. Paul exhorts Timothy: Remain faithful to what you have learned and believed, because you know from whom you learned it, and that from infancy you have known the sacred Scriptures, which are capable of giving you wisdom for salvation through faith in Christ Jesus. All Scripture is inspired by God and is useful for teaching, for refutation, for correction, and for training in righteousness, so that one who belongs to God may be competent, equipped for every good work.

Even though St. Paul, when referring to Scripture, is speaking of the Old Testament (the New Testament had not yet been written) the Church's magisterium has interpreted this text to now include the whole Bible. It is a praiseworthy practice to read and pray with the Bible every day. Grace be with you all,
